






A collaborative approach to our children's safety





"Stay away from strangers" is a popular phrase used when discussing safety with children.



THE EXPLOITER OR ABDUCTOR: NOT NECESSARILY A "STRANGER."



- ■This approach can mislead children into believing that they should be concerned only about people who they do not know or who have an unusual appearance.
- Abductors and exploiters are usually "acquaintances".
- ■Describing a "stranger" can be difficult for an adult to explain and is even more difficult for a child to understand



Instead, it is more effective to teach children to:

- Avoid people who are not known to parents, and
- •Get away from uncomfortable situations involving anyone, including friends and acquaintances.



WHAT YOU CAN DO TO PREVENT ABDUCTION AND EXPLOITATION.





Know where your children are and who they are interacting with.

- •Be familiar with daily activities.

 Remind older children to occasionally call home.
- •Know your children's friends and their families.



Avoid placing your child's name in a visible place:

- Clothing.
- Back pack.
- Lunch box.
- Bicycle.



A child may not realize that someone who knows his or her name may not necessarily be a friend.



If you become "lost", do not wander.

- •Immediately go to a "trustworthy" person (i.e., cashier, security guards, uniformed police officer) and ask for help.
- Stay away from people in cars, vans or trucks.
- You don't need to go near the car to talk to the people inside.




If someone holds you or attempts to take you somewhere, <u>immediately</u>:

- Pull down (versus away) and run.
- Pull out of your jacket, shirt, back pack, etc. and run.
- •Hold onto or wrap your arms and legs around anything (bicycle, fence, tree). Don't let go.



What your child needs to know If approached by a stranger





NO: Child should tell the stranger "NO".

GO: Child should get away (run away) from the stranger.

YELL: Child should yell to draw attention to themselves.

TELL: Child should tell a trusted adult.



If pulled into a vehicle.

- •Open the door and run from the vehicle as soon as it stops in traffic, at an intersection, toll booth, store, etc.
- •If possible, jump into the back seat.

 Open the door and run when the vehicle stops. The person cannot control you and drive at the same time.



Before going anywhere, always tell a parent or the person in charge (i.e., teacher, babysitter) where you are going.

•If plans change, check first. Never accept a ride before getting approval.



Run away from danger, never toward it.

- •If someone in a car follows you, turn around and run in the opposite direction.
- •Run to a safe place (i.e., any place where there are other people) not a wooded area or unoccupied building.



Adults Should

- •Create an environment that encourages your child to let you know if they are approached.
- •Let them know they will not be in trouble. CALL THE POLICE immediately.



- •We do not close and you are not bothering us.
- •If the suspect is still in the area, we will go to the area and search. We may also set up a perimeter.
- The police can contact adjoining jurisdictions and the school both during the school day and after hours.



Adults Should

- •Identify pre-existing safe areas in your neighborhoods. (Schools, government buildings, neighbors you know, etc.)
- Have a "Safety Plan" and practice the safety plan.
- •Teach children what to do if approached by a stranger and then practice what to do.



Educate Your Children

- •If a consistent and repeated message is given to our children about strangers, it will re-enforce for them what to do if confronted.
- •This can be achieved by all of us working together, providing the same message to our children.
